

SPRING - HOPE - NEW LIFE

Normally at this time each year we probably have our minds focussed on either of the approaching Seasons – Spring and Footy finals – or even perhaps both. This year we are also facing (at the time of writing) the prospect of a new Prime Minister and for many of us a state election. Each of these affects us.

Spring is the season of great promise. The days are getting longer, the sun seems to be getting warmer. The grass is growing again other plants are beginning to either sprout or bloom. Where gardeners have been preparing their plots there is the hope that their efforts will bring about the desired effect. There is hopefully a sense of renewal. Many of us go through the annual "spring cleaning" and consigning the winter woollies to the back of the wardrobe as we brush off the dust on our warm weather gear. The colours are more vivid and the feeling of "greyness" we have had through winter begins to leave us.

The finals bring with them a change of pace. For those of us who are fans of the teams that didn't "get there" we look forward in hope for next year and hope that the deficiencies our team has can be remedied in the "off season" through changes made within or the inclusion of new talent from without. For those of us who are fans of the teams that did make it, the real season begins now. We look towards and dream about the ultimate prize, success in the final game and the celebrations that accompany this. We are spurred on by the hope that this time it will be ours to celebrate, something more poignant for those who haven't seen "September action" for many years.

In Politics, those wanting a change in leadership are also seeking to reinvigorate the Party and hoping that the new leader will bring them a new sense of purpose. For those facing an election, there is hope that the election campaign will result in a win on election day and that all their hard work will be rewarded. For those of us looking on from the side lines, we hope that good government is the result of all the campaigning – both within the parties and at the elections.

If we look at where we are in the church's year we see that we are called to look once again into our hearts and see what our response is to the message of Jesus in Mark's gospel. We have just finished the journey through Chapter 6 of John's Gospel in which we are reminded of the fact that our God gives us what we need to sustain ourselves. Over the coming weeks we are called to 1) denounce the hypocrisies which we all carry within us; 2) review our own openness to the world; 3) remind ourselves of the cost of discipleship; 4) accept humbly our own vocation; 5) reconsider and accept the giftedness of others and 6) through allowing children to feel welcomed into our community to nurture the new life that comes.

All of these are not meant to be harsh criticisms of us. They are there as an invitation to us to recommit ourselves to the vocation that each of us has. They are there for us to use as we prepare ourselves for the end game of the Church's year the feast of Christ the King. The lessons around us should be obvious. If we want a great garden, we need to work hard at it. If we want a sustainable future, we need to work hard towards changing the way in which we are stewards of creation. If our team is to be premiers then it is the result of hard work and good preparation. If we want good government then we need to elect the best people possible. Finally, if we want an alive church that is faithful to the message of Jesus, then we are the people who are called to make it happen. As St Vincent Pallotti taught, we are all Apostles and we are all called to proclaim the good news by what we say and more importantly what we do. Jesus was recognised through the breaking of the bread, we are called to feed others. As the words to the old song go "they'll know we are Christians by our love ..."



THE KERALA FLOODS IN INDIA

We are all aware of the catastrophic floods that have recently impacted on the state of Kerala in India. Several of our Pallottine Priests are from Kerala and have had families impacted.

While the actual flood waters have subsided the loss of homes and contents, the increase in the incidence of disease, infrastructure damage as well as the mourning for those who have died or were injured, are all aspects that will take years for memories and losses to diminish and buildings and infrastructure to be repaired.

Donations have been forwarded to India from Australia through the Pallottine Fathers and Brothers and the National Coordination Council of the UAC. Many parishes have had special collections and not for profit organisations are seeking donations. I understand that the Melbourne Archbishop has recommended donations be sent through Caritas Australia. Many will have contributed though their parish or other organisations. As Father Jacob Nampudakam, the SAC Rector General noted in a recent email relating to the floods "The real joy can be found only in giving."

We ask that you keep all of the residents of Kerala, the Pallottine Priests who are working in Australia and their families in your prayer at this time. Being so far from home when you know your family are going through much trauma must be very distressing.

Fr. Eugene San and myself received invitations from the Beagle Bay Community to be their guests at their upcoming 100 Year Jubilee celebration of the Beagle Bay Church on August 11 and 12.

We both flew to Broome and then were driven to Beagle Bay where we were accommodated by the Community in one of their houses for visitors. The road trip of 120 km was rather trying, it gives you the shakes.

On the evening (7pm) of Saturday August 11 Community and visitors were offered a 2-hour concert. Bishop Christopher Saunders opened the celebrations and conducted a Reconciliation Service with many priests hearing confessions. He spoke about the Mercy of God.

The concert following was interspersed with present and former Community members giving witness to their memories of growing up and living in Beagle Bay and speaking about their faith. A free meal and drinks were offered to all present during the concert and also during the celebrations on Sunday.

The highlight of the celebrations was the Eucharist on Sunday led by Bishop Christopher Saunders together with ca. 14 dozen priests, three of them Pallottines, which included also Fr. Ray Hevern. There were hundreds of people present. Visitors had come from Broome and Lombadina and also from the other parishes and communities of the diocese. Others had made the journey from Perth.

Some women blessed us all with Holy Water Kimberley style using large branches. Three women from Balgo and Mulan each had brought with them large paintings, one of them depicting the journey of the Church in the Kimberley. Some of the young girls from Beagle Bay brightened up the liturgy with graceful dancing.

Mass finished with the special blessing sung and given by all present.

"People remember that this church didn't just happen. People built it and their hearts and their love went into it," Bishop Christopher Saunders said.

The St Vincent Pallotti Scholarship Trust is seeking increased capital donations to fulfil its mandate.

This Scholarship Trust was established in 2008 to offer financial assistance to lay people to enhance their knowledge and skills to benefit their ministry.

Applicants are expected to demonstrate their prior involvement in a particular area.

Recent examples are:

- involvement with young people, particularly in schools

- organising groups for World Youth Day & mission work overseas

- counselling/pastoral ministry
- clinical pastoral care

Applications may be for ongoing work or for one - off activities.

Interest from the Trust's existing capital usually funds around four applications annually, with grants being between \$500 and \$3,000.

Our inspiration is the vision of our founder, St Vincent Pallotti, who in his own time and space committed his life to supporting and developing the vocation of lay people in their ministry within the church – in his case in Italy.

Until a few years ago, the Rosary was a prayer I only prayed at funerals and considered rather "out moded." Then, in a conversation with a couple of friends, they spoke about how and when they prayed the Rosary, often when out walking (or in one case running!) I thought "really, can't you just walk." A few weeks later, when walking and finding my mind going in rather uncharitable directions, I thought, "it would be better to pray for the person rather than thinking negative thoughts!" So started my "Rosary Journey."

That was a few years ago, now walking or driving, or travelling on trams and trains, I pray a Rosary. In addition to the "usual mysteries" I have developed what I call "The Human Mysteries." Jesus, the man and some of his actions that can call me to mission, to my apostolate. That – again with the encouragement of some friends – is what I would like to share in this Newsletter.

The Baptism of Jesus – he walked into do the water along with all of the local people, not setting himself above or apart. Do I live as an equal with all of my sisters and brothers?

Jesus calling of his apostles – he did not choose the clever, the professionals, and he chose ordinary people – all people and called them. How often do I look past and not listen to the wisdom given by "ordinary" people.

Jesus at Cana - Jesus told his mother "his time had not yet come" and yet when she asked he responded. Do I see the face of Jesus in others who request or suggest or advise something and respond?

Jesus and the Widow at Nain – he was walking past and reached out and raised a strangers son. Do I reach out to those on the periphery and respond?

Jesus and Mary Magdalen – "Go and tell the others" - A call to evangelisation when do I joyfully go out and "tell the others."



So these are the mysteries I often pray. They always remind me of Vincent's charism. I share them with you as we head towards the month of The Rosary.
