A Universal Majesty on the Hill! (Pallotti College THEN)

When was the last time you visited the universal majesty that sits atop the Millgrove hill?

Have you considered the gift it may be to simply stand and gaze in awe at the wonder of the giant gums arching towards the splendour of the open skies?

You may recall the silent aura near the buildings of Pallotti College, Millgrove surrounded by and clothed in the stunning beauty that lies before you; then falls gently away into the valley beyond.

Perhaps it may be time to offer yourself a re-visit to this gift that stands sentinel amongst these awesome surroundings. Yes, it is just a shortish pleasant drive from Melbourne city central.

Pope Francis may speak with eloquence within his recent encyclical - Laudato si'. This encyclical seems to have taken some of our world by storm (pardon the pun) but it offers a concrete invitation, among other things, to look again at our natural environment. It is our natural environment which largely sustains us. Laudato si' becomes an urgent invitation to stop, re-assess and contribute something positive towards our natural environment. It may be as simple as being aware of the rubbish we discard. It may be to stop and look again at that clump of tangled weeds - which holds its own inner beauty - if we can 'but see'. It may be an invitation to become more aware of who we are and how our natural environment, a majestic gift from 'the Other', sustains us. Laudato si', then, is inviting us to recognize the gift and return some realistic concern for our environment. There may be increasing talk of climate change, with all this might entail, which imperceptibly seems to be entangling its tentacles around mother earth. Yet here, awaiting guietly shrouded in its own micro climate is all that Pope Francis is urging us to be mindful of, respectful of and save. 'Eco-spirituality eat your heart out'! Pallotti hill has it all.

When was the last time you stood, at night, within the buildings' forecourt and smelled the aroma of the eucalyptus wafting down from the forest canopy beyond to embrace your sense of smell? Ah, the sheer gift!

A meander along the descending pathway which passes Brother Frank's 'famous' (or infamous) former pig shed takes one into another treasure trove of silence. There one may glimpse a robin red breast bouncing along the wired fence to accompany you on a quiet solitary stroll.

To amble along the aqueduct walk (which sits above the College acreage) at dusk offers a gentle tranquility. Within the silence and stillness, one may be mesmerized by the dappled light dancing amidst the trees splashing its reflected light towards the valley far below.

When was the last time you simply stood? Yes, just stood and listened to the deafening sounds of silence trumpeted from the forest floor above the aqueduct pathway?

When was the last time you took such time to actually live Laudato si'?

For me, it sits before us on Pallotti Hill if we but have the eyes to see, the ears to hear and the spirit to grasp the gift offered to us.

Perhaps, it may be time to consider a re-visit to the hill. It will not disappoint if one but looks beyond the self towards the natural surrounds pointing in every direction. As Gerard Manly Hopkins so eloquently put it – 'the world is charged with the wonder of God'. It really is in the palm of our hands at the top of McNamara's hill ; if we can but see.

We have learnt that the monuments for Clare Bowler and Thomas Dickinson are scheduled for completely new headstones and surrounds a little bit later in the year. The Saint John of God have included Clare and Tom's graves with other works they are having done for some of their Sisters.

All are being replaced with the same as the ones shown in the photo attached. Each grave will cost \$5000. I have been in contact with Sandy Busio from the Saint John of God Regional Office, who has said they would welcome any contribution we can offer. The sisters recognise the long-standing relationship between them and the lay missionaries of the Kimberley in the past.

YOU WILL KNOW THEM BY THEIR FRUITS

The year was 1959 some of us were not even born and others, mere toddlers or just children, but it was the commencement of 'lay missionary training' which would continue until the late 1980's. As we all know it was under the direction of Father Wally Silvester and Barb Shea. They would 'train' enthusiastic disciples and send them trekking across our vast country to distantly remote outposts in Western Australia.

They could not possibly have foreseen the fruits of their labours, however 62 years later a small gathering of LM's could join with Barb to celebrate what was the 50th anniversary of the 1971 group. Their Spirit would extend far beyond what they could ever hope for or imagine.

Barb would leave her comfort zone to join one of the biggest risk takers you could possibly meet outside of Jesus. Millgrove was the perfect setting in February, hot and clammy, humid and sweaty, copious bush flies in the day, buzzingly thirsty mosquitoes at night. All this in a tranquil paradise as Father Wally would spend mornings trying to open green minds and hearts to concepts like the Big You and the little you. Meanwhile Barb would be in another room quietly praying that (a) none of us would get up and leave (b) that the whole adventure would be safe and successful, including decisions about who should go with whom and where. The great risk taker would always require the guiding hand of a Marian Spirit.

On those late nights where we sat up discussing the input of the day, we had numerous unanswered questions, only to be dumbfounded the next day as Father Wally would help us discover the answers to those very same questions. Had he been listening at the door the night before? We were exposed to some good old fashioned work before a well earned and refreshing dip in the Yarra.

This 1971 group meets regularly, usually at Cheryl's place, to reminisce, to acknowledge blessings and to be thankful. We have since our days at Millgrove formed lasting friendships including a couple of marriages. We have not had to manufacture
